

The Takatamatsubara Memorial park for TSUNAMI Disaster has been created through the cooperation of the national governments and local governments of Iwate, Miyagi, and Fukushima prefecture. They aim to pass down the memories and lessons learned to the next generation, as well as a desire to provide a place for memorial and reflection on those lost in the disaster, as well as communicate their strong desire to rebuild to the rest of the world. The memorial area is managed by the national government, with the Iwate government joining in by creating the Iwate Tsunami Memorial Museum and the *Michi-no-Eki Takatamatsubara* (rest stop).


