Takatamatsubara Memorial Park for TSUNAMI Disaster

National Memorial Facility

Both national and local government agencies have worked together to establish a memorial park dedicated to the recovery effort, and on its grounds stands a national memorial facility that, along with conveying to the world the region's strong will to recover, is dedicated to remembering the victims of the Great East Japan Earthquake, and passing on the memories and lessons learned from the disaster to future generations.



Disaster ruins ①
Kesen Junior High School

The tsunami submerged the three-story reinforced concrete school building all the way to the roof. All students were able to immediately evacuate to higher ground.



Disaster ruins ②
The Miracle Pine Tree

Where there once stood over 70,000 trees, only this single pine tree remains. The miracle pine tree died the year after the disaster. It has been preserved as an official monument.



Disaster ruins ③
Rikuzentakata Youth Hostel

This accommodation once stood in Takatamatsubara. It is believed that this building prevented the tsunami from hitting the miracle pine tree.



Disaster ruins ④
Taptic 45 (for Michi-no-Eki Takatamatsubara)

Three evacuees used this building to escape the 14.5m tall tsunami. The top of the building was untouched. The inside was completely destroyed.



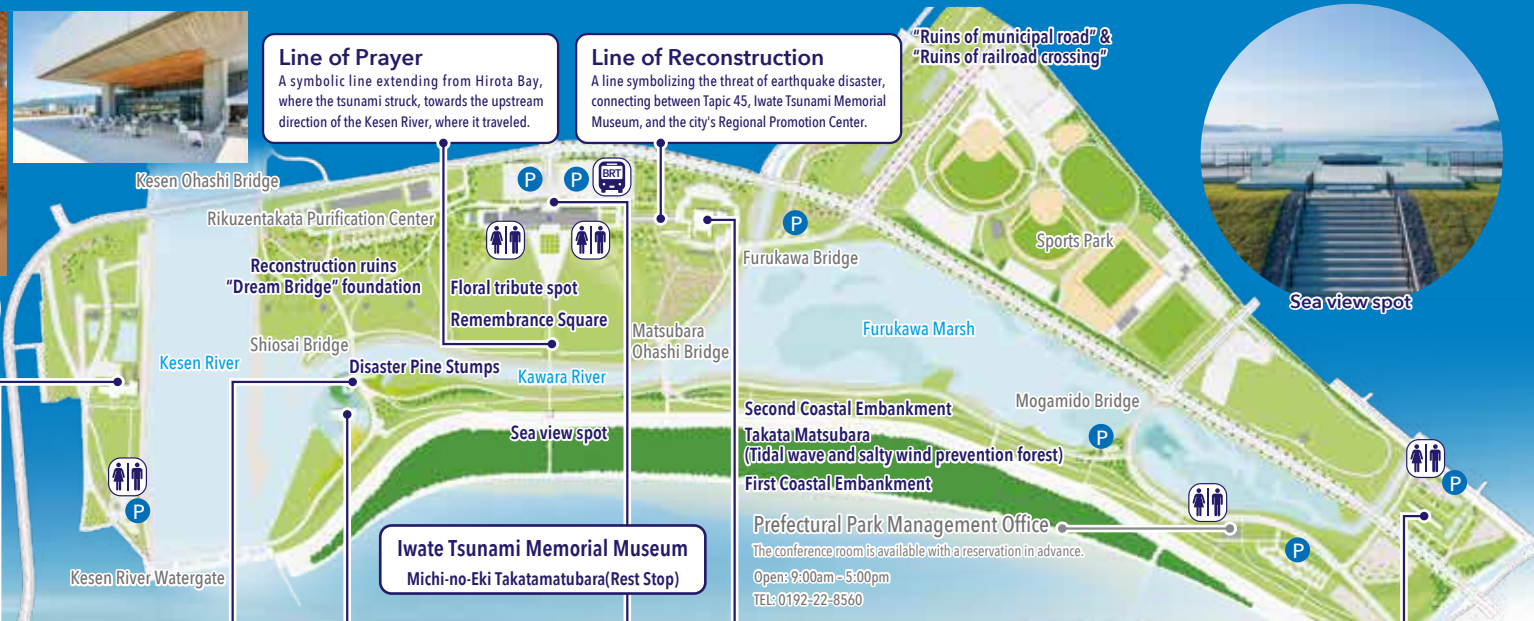
Disaster ruins ⑤
Settlement Promotion Housing

The tsunami flooded the building to the fourth floor. Only the balcony panels on the fifth floor remains, providing a glimpse at how high the waves reached.

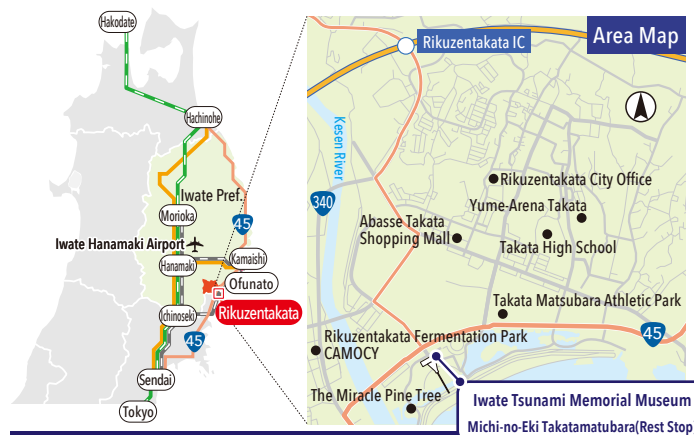

Zone 1 Tracing History

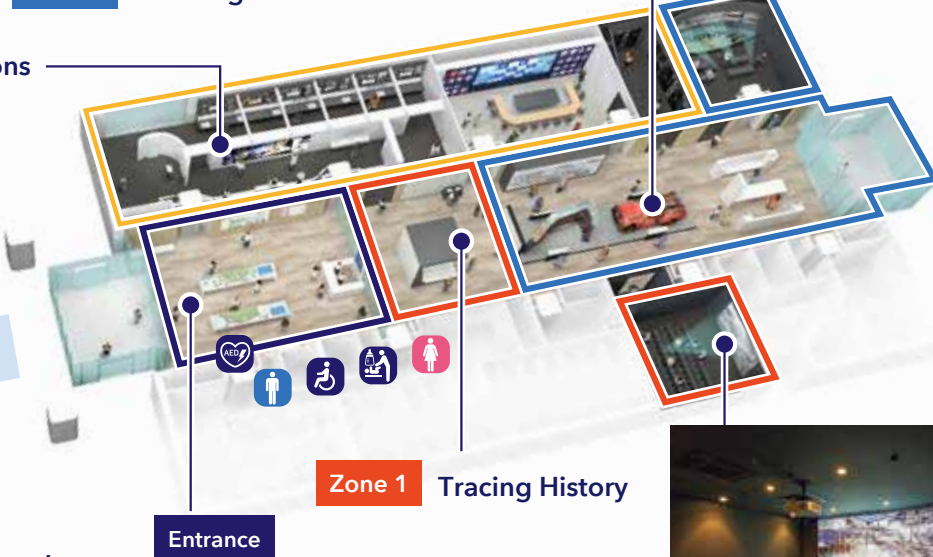
